ENF SCHOLARSHIP CONTEST

The 2022 Elks National Foundation Most Valuable Student Scholarship Contest is open! This contest is open to any high school senior who is a citizen of the United States. Applicants do not need to be related to a member of the Elks. The application is completed online at Elks.org. Click on "Scholarships," then "Most Valuable Student." There are frequently asked questions and the actual application. Applicants are judged on scholarship, leadership, community service, financial need, and an essay. The application deadline is November 15, 2021. Our Lodge awards the top three boys and top three girls \$500 each. Those six students are then eligible for scholarships awarded by the Wisconsin Elks Association and the Elks National Foundation. Last years' scholarship recipients were:

She eventually became senior teen editor at the newspaper. Christy will attend Stanford University and major in political science. Christy also won a \$1,000 scholarship from the ENF.

Geneghee Kim from Middleton. During high school, he also worked at Central Wisconsin Center assisting therapists and organizing activities for its patients. He will attend Vanderbilt and major in medicine, health and society. Geneghee also won a \$1,000 scholarship from the ENF.

POSTCARD FROM THE PAST



The barbecues sponsored by the Madison Elks in the 1920s attracted thousands of people. The photo here, taken in 1900, was in front of the old Lodge on Monona Avenue (Martin Luther King, Jr., Blvd.). The building in the background is the old Dorn stables. While the cooking crew looks on, great hunks of beef smoke on skewers resting on 4×4 timbers laid across barrels. The fire pit was five feet deep and 25 feet long.

THE REMODEL

By 1949, the old Lodge on Monona Avenue at Doty Street was almost 50 years old. Many modifications had already been made, but the members decided it was time for a total makeover in order to better accommodate their needs. Just like our 50-year-old facility today, much of the infrastructure was starting to show its age. The plumbing and electrical systems were outdated. The first floor restaurant and bar were too small. There was no air conditioning.


The Trustees established a committee composed of E. N. Quinn, chairman, Frank Starkweather, Al Reque, A. M. Kurtz and M. L. Wellentin to investigate the feasibility of remodeling and improving the clubhouse. At the membership meeting on January 25,

The old Lodge as it appeared in 1951.




\$80,000. That same night, by a vote of 118 to 42, the motion was defeated. Obviously, much discussion ensued and the case for making improvements on a piece-meal basis won the day. The membership authorized the Board to make recommendations for repairs and renovations from time to time, including the removal of the stage in the Lodge Hall and installation of new lighting and ventilation systems. Ultimately, a plan that cost about \$20,000 was approved. It included taking out the bowling alleys in the basement and replacing them with a larger restaurant, kitchen and bar, at the time located on the main floor.

On October 13, 1951, fifty years to the day after the laying of the Lodge's cornerstone, the Madison Elks celebrated the grand opening of its remodeled clubhouse. Ten years later, the membership concluded that its home no longer was large enough to accommodate the 1,500 plus Elks and a search ensued for suitable property. This effort led to the selection of a lakefront site on Jenifer Street. The Bank of Madison then offered the Board \$256,000 for the Monona Avenue property and agreed to secure an option on the lot for the new building (valued at \$75,000). On September 26, by an overwhelming vote, the membership decided to sell the old Lodge and move ahead with building a new one. On April 4, 1964, ground was broken at 711 Jenifer Street. On hand was Ernest John Frederick "Ernie" Burmeister (1867-1965), the only living charter member of the Madison B.P.O.E. Mr. Burmeister, elected Dane County Sheriff in 1900 at age 33, was the youngest to ever serve in that office and nicknamed the "Boy Sheriff."
