

#### POSTCARD FROM THE PAST



In 1905, the legendary circus entrepreneur Al. Ringling built the largest and most costly home in Sauk County. Located on Broadway at Fifth Avenue in Baraboo, Elks Lodge #688 acquired the property in 1936 and added a dance hall and bowling alley. By 2011, the facility had necessitated numerous repairs, some of which required the local Elks to borrow money. With a dwindling membership, in 2013 it decided to sell the building now listed on the National Historic Registry. B.P.O.E. #688 continued to lease the basement bowling alley and bar until moving into a new downtown facility in 2019. Today the Al. Ringling Mansion operates as a museum and microbrewery.

#### **ROY HARRISON PROCTOR**



1891 - 1964 Exalted Ruler 1930 - 1931

For 30 years, Proctor served as a judge on Dane County's Superior Court. At the time of his death on January 9, 1968, he had served longer than any other Dane County judge. In tribute to him, Superior Court was renamed Criminal and Traffic Court on January 1, 1962, the day he left the bench. Judge Proctor continued to serve as a court commissioner.

He had the reputation as a fair but compassionate judge, sometimes bending the law to give a lesser sentence or dismiss the case. He had a remarkable ability to remember faces and names, so defendants did not want to appear before him a second time.

One of Judge Proctor's last cases involved a man picked up for vagrancy who had appeared before him more than 278 times previously. "I didn't expect to see you here on my last day," Proctor said. "You were one of my first customers weren't you?"

Through his long tenure Proctor shrugged off all criticism about lenient sentences. The public loved him and never in his eight years on the bench was he seriously challenged in an election. "My court is the human court and I run it that way," he said when the State Motor Vehicle Department complained his dismissal of traffic

cases for payment of costs were negating the points system.

Judge Proctor got his first order on how to run his court just six months before his retirement when the attorney general got an order to stop his dismissal of traffic cases in exchange for payment of court costs. The white-haired Judge just smiled and then dismissed cases without even payment of court costs when he thought they did not deserve points.

That is not to say his tenure was without controversy. In 1951, six irate women protested Judge Proctor's dismissal of a charge of "willful and wanton reckless driving" against a male driver who ignored Mrs. E. B. A. Sokoloski's turn signal. Her car had been hit by a professor driving a truck that belonged to the University of Wisconsin farms. The six women including Mrs. Sokoloski occupied the Judge's office.

Judge Proctor a special citizenship award. He was introduced at the awards dinner "as the judge who dispenses justice with a heart." The Judge explained it this way: "After the experience of a few hundred cases, you begin to stop being shocked by the stories you hear and remember you are dealing with human beings." His sense of

humor meant his wry remarks often ended up in the newspapers and were frequently carried nationwide by the wire services. Never once while he presided in court did he don a black robe, considering it pompous.

At one of a series of banquets honoring him upon his retirement, Governor Gaylord Nelson praised Proctor: "You are loved by everyone – which is something that cannot be said about any other public servant in this state or elsewhere."

Roy Proctor was born on December 19, 1891, in Chicago, Illinois, but grew up in Natick, Massachusetts, a suburb of Boston. He lived in Rochester, Indiana, before moving to Madison in 1909 to enroll in the University of Wisconsin. Initially a journalism student, Roy decided to become a lawyer. He graduated from the U.W. Law School in 1915 and set up private practice in Madison. When World War I came, he enlisted in the U.S. Army. Roy Proctor served on the Madison Common Council from 1921 – 1925 and was later appointed to the Board of Public Works. He was first elected a judge in 1932.

On March 12, 1930, he was elected Exalted Ruler of Madison Elks Lodge #410. He was also a member of the Madison Masonic Lodge and an avid bowler. His wife, Mildred Armstrong, preceded him in death and he was survived by a son, daughter and five grandchildren. Judge Roy H. Parker is buried in Forest Hill Cemetery (Section 1, Lot 11).
